
## Year 11 Student Uniform Expectations

## **Student Lanyards!**


## All students now MUST wear their own personal lanyard at ALL times!

Students will be given a lanyard that they <u>must</u> keep around their neck at all times so that it is visible to staff.

- ➤ They will need to show their ID card when they enter through the gate/reception in the morning
- > They will need this lanyard to pay for their school lunch
  - They will need this lanyard to access the toilets (1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floor)

If they are found in school without one they will be escorted to their year team.






## What if I lose or forget my lanyard/card?



- •All students will be checked for their lanyard and ID card at the gate/reception. Not having this with them will cause inconvenience for the student and the year team.
- •Parent/Carers will be contacted to bring in the lanyard and or ID card if they have forgotten it.
- •If the lanyard and/or ID card has been lost the year team will provide a temporary day card (only once). The Parent/Carer will be contacted by the year team to purchase a new lanyard and or ID card via parentpay that same day.
- •Repeated loss/forgetting/refusing to wear may involve Parent/Carer meetings and or sanctions.

## **Our Expectations of St Augustine's Students**

- ➤ Attendance is kept above 96% throughout the year
- >Year 11s attend all lessons on time and are ready to learn
- They come to school prepared, with correct school uniform and equipment needed for lessons
- ➤ Year 11s attend all intervention/revision sessions available to them
- Complete homework and revision to a high standard
- >Students demonstrate positive behaviour and attitude to learning.





## **Homework Expectations**



- All students vary in terms of how much time they should be spending on homework. They should be doing something everyday.
- > Roughly 30 mins-2 hours (depending) as they prepare for their GCSEs.
- > Each subject will set homework depending on the department policy
- ➤ Homework is compulsory and there will be sanctions if homework is not completed on time or to a sufficient standard.

## How you can support your child



- Encourage them to attend school everyday (attendance should be over 96%)
- Encourage them to be on time (they should be here by 8:40am)
- Not being on their phone/console until late in the night
- Encourage daily reading/revision/homework at home
- If they say they have done their homework/revision Show don't tell
- Ask them to explain what they are learning to you.

## How you can support your child

- They should be getting enough sleep (NHS recommends 8-10 hours a night for 15/16 year olds)
- Fresh air, exercise and plenty of water
- Please Support with sanctions from home if they are not meeting expectations.
- No holidays during term time
- Together we can work as a team to ensure that your child gets the most of their time and experience here at St Augustine's and truly is the best that they can possibly be!

- □ Are you doing/producing something with what you are reading?

#### **Mind maps**

- $\square$  Are they based on a specific section of the specification?
- □ Do they include key concepts?
- □ Do they include possible exam questions?
- □ Do they include key words?
- □ Do they include case studies?
- □ Do they include pictures?
- □ Are they neat and easy to understand?

#### **Remaking class notes**

- $\square$  Are they based on a specific section of the specification?
- Do they include key concepts?
- □ Do they include possible exam questions?
- □ Do they include key words?
- □ Do they include case studies?
- □ Do they include pictures?
- □ Are they neat and easy to understand?

## St Augustine's 6th Form Entry Requirements


> 5x Subjects at a Grade 9-5, including English and Maths

## **Paying for Tutors**

Please be very careful when selecting a tutor for your child. Important questions to ask are:

- Does the Tutor have experience with the correct exam board (e.g. AQA)
- ➤ Has the tutor taught these courses themselves (and remember these were new from 2017)
- > Does the tutor have experience and knowledge of the texts/options taught at St. Augustine's?
- ➤ We find many children who have tutors who are working on content and papers that are not relevant to or in the same style as their final GCSE exams which means that they are not preparing correctly for their final exams.
- Tutor work needs to support the work going on in class and not divert from it.

## At St Augustine's we are a Trauma Informed School
